How do you think the bell came to be known as the Liberty Bell? (liberty means freedom) Page C – Explain that the word constitution means a list of all of our ideas and laws as a new country. Why was it important to begin our newly formed country with a constitution? Page D – Show Tennessee on the map and talk about its shape and location on the map. Explain what a map is used for and how it is flat. Page E – Discussion about the eagle as a national symbol. The writer uses a certain technique to write the sentences. What is it?
