T U E S D A Y	Show Slides 32-35. Emphasis today is on the State Bird and State Wild Animal. Epic: Raccoon (students should be able to read this aloud as it is projected) https://www.getepic.com/app/read/48085 Make a list of characteristics of a bird and a raccoon. See writing prompt.		What size bird is a mockingbird considered to be? Is the mockingbird a fat bird? How do you know. Find text evidence showing the size of the bird. What does a mockingbird eat? Why is it called a mockingbird? Show the students a yardstick. Have students show you on the yardstick how long a raccoon usually is. What does it mean when it says a raccoon is nocturnal? Do you know of other animals that are nocturnal? What do raccoons eat?	Using the list of characteristics, compare a bird with a raccoon. (Example: Today we learned about the state bird and the state animal. The bird has feathers and the raccoon has fur)	Tennessee Passport: As an exit idea, have students share one fact with you about the bird and raccoon. Have them glue those pictures in their passport booklet.
